

Purpose of national and other governmental archives

- Repository for permanently valuable records.
- Make sure accurate records are available when disputes arise.
- Prove rights, confirm obligations, verify events and substantiate claims
- Provide evidence, explanation and justification both for past actions and current decisions.
- Increase our sense of identity and understanding
- Archives tell stories

Archives of businesses, governments, organizations are important records that tell stories.

Current archival principles are that records deemed to be permanently valuable should be preserved and made available for use as soon as possible.

Privacy and security concerns sometimes limit access for a specific time period.

Help librarians and archivists when they ask for help:

- In opening records
- In preventing destruction of records
- In changing or preventing changes in the rules of access including time period and costs

Difference in Libraries and Archives

Libraries

- Access is usually item by item access
- Collect and provide access to <u>published</u> materials regardless of format (digital, print, film, etc.) to keep people informed, promote scholarship and provide entertainment
- Some libraries have research or special collections that have manuscript materials that may be organized as in an archive

Difference in Libraries and Archives

Archives

- Few items in an archive have access points that take you to that one item. Access is to the collection and then multiple materials within that collection such as a file folder, a box of papers, etc.
- Collect and provide access to <u>unpublished</u> materials usually of the government, company, organization that created the materials. The creator is the primary organizing entity for archives.
- Users usually have to wade through lots of pages to locate the information needed.



Using the NARA web site:

The National Archives website has articles, finding aids, webinars, and other information about our records and how to conduct research in our holdings. Additionally, we have a growing number of digitized records available online through the National Archives Catalog and in AAD that are useful for researching family history online.

What Information is Available Online Here:

- Topics on genealogical records held in the Archives.
- Reference Reports: Short descriptions of research strategies for frequently used records of genealogical interest
 held at the National Archives Building in Washington, DC. (Most of the records described are on microfilm, and

Though we do not have family trees or documents showing lineage of your ancestors and their descendants, we do have many documents you can research to construct your family's history.

Forexample, if your relatives:

- lived in the U.S. sometime from 1790-1930, they may have been included in the census.
- were veterans of an American war, beginning with the American Revolution, they may have military and pension records.
- arrived in a boat at an American port or crossed borders from Canada or Mexico, they may be listed in immigration records.
- became American citizens through the Federal courts, they may be found in our naturalization records holdings.
- were members of an American Indian tribe, you may find them in our Native American records.
- was of African-American descent, you may find them in post-Civil War records.
- obtained a United States Government passport, their passport applications may be found.
- received a land grant from the United States
 Government, you may find a land entry case file for them.
- and many more circumstances that generated records

What is in the National Archives Catalog?

The National Archives holds historical U.S. government documents (federal, congressional, and presidential records) that are created or received by the President and his staff, by Congress, by employees of Federal government agencies, and by the Federal courts in the course of their official duties.

The National Archives Catalog contains descriptions for NARA's nationwide holdings in the Washington, DC area; regional facilities; and Presidential Libraries. The Catalog is a work in progress and currently contains descriptions for 95% of our records, described at the series level. This means you can find basic information about the records, including size and location, from the description. Additionally, every week we are adding more file unit and item descriptions, many of which include digital files.

Typically descriptions in the Catalog do not include individuals' names; however, the National Archives still might have records about your ancestors. It may be necessary to closely read records of interest to see if a particular individual is mentioned.

The National Archives Catalog vs. Online Genealogy Databases

- The Catalog is keyword searchable like many genealogy databases.
- · You can narrow searches with filters.
- The Catalog allows you to search for records in all NARA facilities not just selected databases.
- The current focus is on breadth of NARA's holdings (at the series level) and not individual records.
- · Most Catalog descriptions do not include individual names.

The Catalog contains many descriptions of records that are of interest to genealogists and family historians, including:

- · Applications for enrollment in Native American tribes
- Court records
- Fugitive slave cases
- · Land records
- Military personnel records
- · Naturalization records
- Federal employees



How Do I Search in the National Archives Catalog?

The Catalog contains descriptions of records held by the National Archives. Researchers can conduct keyword searches and filtered searched in the Catalog.

To perform a simple keyword search:

- 1. Gaita https://cetalog.archives.gov
- 2. Enter same keywards of your choice in the search box in the center of the page. If you are looking for an exact phrase using two or more words, put them in quotation marks example: "bounty land"
- 3. Press the magnifying glass button to run your search.
- 4. When hits are returned for your search, the results will be returned starting with best results at the top. Use the filters on the left side to narrow down your results.

Tips for Using Filters

Are you looking only for a photograph? Select Photographs and Other Graphic Materials

Many of our descriptions do not include digital images of the records, click on the filter Archival Descriptions with Digital Objects to see only descriptions with images attached

5. To view a description, click on the blue title. View our video Anatomy of a Description to learn about the features of a description.



Tips for Searching for an Individual's Name

There isn't a specific field for names in the Catalog; as a result you many need to try several different searches using different strategies when searching for a name.

- · Search on the person's full name in first name-last name order.
- . Search on the surname only. The records might only include a first initial or a variant spelling of the first name.
- · Search on variant spellings of the surname using OR, for example: Luchetti OR Lucetti.

This list of free black heads of families was compiled from the printed volumes of the 1790 census, the Reconstruction of the 1790 Census of Delaware by Leon DeValinger, and the Heads of Families of Virginia, taken from the "Records of the State Enumerations, 1782-85." Names of black heads of families appear in the census records for most States under the column "All Other Free Persons" except for Virginia, where they are listed under the heading "Black," and Delaware, where they are listed under "Free Negro." Indians were the only other substantial racial group of the time that might have been included under "All Other Free Persons," but few Indians who were taxed lived in the United States. This list gives the names of the black heads of families and the number of persons in each family, but not the geographic location. Page numbers from the 1790 census volumes are given because the names in the census lists are not in alphabetical order.

This list can be used for research in the Archives relating to pre-Federal, Revolutionary War, and "Federal Period" records and for genealogical research.



Some of the older printed finding aids listed in this pamphlet may be in short supply—if not out of print—but are still useful. NARA filmed many of them up to the year 2001 in National Archives Microfilm Publication M248, Publications of the National Archives, 1935—. This 52-roll series is thus a valuable resource for many of those guides to records that are listed in the body of this publication but that are out of print or not online.

The publications in M248 were filmed and added to that series in stages: for the years 1936–56, in 1957 (rolls 1–8); 1957–66, in January 1967 (rolls 9–19); 1966–68, in 1970 (rolls 20–24); and for 1968–2001, in the period 1970–2001 (rolls 25–52). The rolls contain a wide variety of publications that are historically interesting for their documentation of the agency's development, including annual reports, agency bulletins and regulations, records administration circulars, and conference proceedings. However, the rolls also contain facsimile reproductions of the following finding aids that remain valuable for current research:



The National Archives was established as an independent agency in 1934 to hold in trust for the American people a vast information resource of the executive, judicial, and legislative branches of the Federal Government. In 1949 it was transferred to the new General Services Administration, where it became the National Archives and Records Service. This service included the Office of Records and Information Management, Federal Records Centers, Presidential Libraries, and the Federal Register, as well as the National Historical Publications and Records Commission. In 1985 the agency again became independent as the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA).

Reproduced on this microfilm publication are various printed materials produced by the Archives from 1935 forward. These include publication series, such as guides, references information papers, preliminary inventories, special lists, exhibit books, conference material, and annual reports. M248 is updated periodically to ensure that it provides comprehensive and current coverage of NARA's publications.



150th Anniversary of the Freedman's Bank

Today's post was written by Damani Davis, reference archivist at the National Archives in Washington, DC.

On March 3, 2015, the National Archives will <u>commemorate the 150th anniversary</u> of the Freedman's Savings & Trust Company, better known as the "Freedman's Bank."

The founding of the Freedman's Bank was spearheaded by John W. Alvord, a Congregationalist minister and abolitionist originally from New England, who served as a chaplain accompanying Gen. William Tecumseh Sherman's troops during their march through Georgia. During his time in Georgia, Alvord observed the destitute conditions of the former slaves and also noted a pressing need for greater financial literacy and some type of savings bank to serve the black soldiers of the U.S. Colored Troops.

received some compensation, others received nothing. Some, including these depositors in the Norfolk, Virginia, branch, tried unsuccessfully in 1880 to petition Congress for reimbursement. (National Archives, Records of the U.S. House of Representatives, RG 233)

The long-term ramifications of this trauma, particularly as it pertains to the subsequent economic history of African Americans, will be discussed at a symposium held at the National Archives for the 150th Anniversary Commemoration on March 3. The symposium will include a brief historical introduction to the Freedman's Bank records, a moderated panel discussion consisting of former Ambassador Andrew Young, John Hope Bryant of Operation Hope, and Vanessa De Luca, editor-in-chief of Essence Magazine, and a post-event reception to be held in Rotunda.

The National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers

Plante was AWOL again. He finally returned on July 2, 1907, having been gone since June 30. This wasn't the first time that Wilfred Plante was considered absent without leave and it wouldn't be the last. In fact, he was becoming a frequent offender. All told, Plante was AWOL at least eleven times. His punishments ranged from being excused to serving thirty days labor without pay. What makes Plante's tale, and charges of AWOL, so interesting is that he wasn't even in the army at the time. Wilfred Plante, a former Union soldier who had served in the Twenty-fifth Massachusetts Infantry, was one of thousands of Civil War veterans living in a soldiers' home run by the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers.

Admitted to the Eastern Branch of the soldiers' home in Togus, Maine, on August 3, 1898, and assigned to Company D, Plante (member #11293) lived out the remainder of his life at the home until his death on October 31, 1926. He was buried in the home cemetery, now a national cemetery maintained by the Department of Veterans Affairs.

Most genealogists have never heard of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers. Many are familiar with the U.S. Soldiers Home in Washington, D.C., or may be even the Naval Home that operated in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. While these two homes served retired members of the Regular Army and Navy, the federal government did not operate volunteer soldiers' homes until after the Civil War.

During the Civil War, many groups assisted veterans in several large cities in the North such as New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Chicago, and Cleveland. The United States Sanitary Commission ran several temporary soldiers' homes. Other asylums, often managed by female benevolent societies, offered short-term relief for disabled soldiers and sailors. During the Civil War, female philanthropist Delphine Baker, through her Chicago publication, the National Banner, pushed for the creation and support of a federally run asylum for disabled Union veterans. Eventually Baker moved to New York City and established the National Literary Association, incorporated in May 1864. The association's goal was to establish a national home for disabled soldiers and sailors through the publication and sale of the National Banner, which also promoted literature, science and the arts.

Baker worked diligently to collect signatures of prominent people for a petition supporting her cause. On December 8, 1864, a petition asking for "the passage of a bill appropriating money for the founding and support of a national home totally disabled soldiers and sailors of the army and navy of the United States," was referred to
